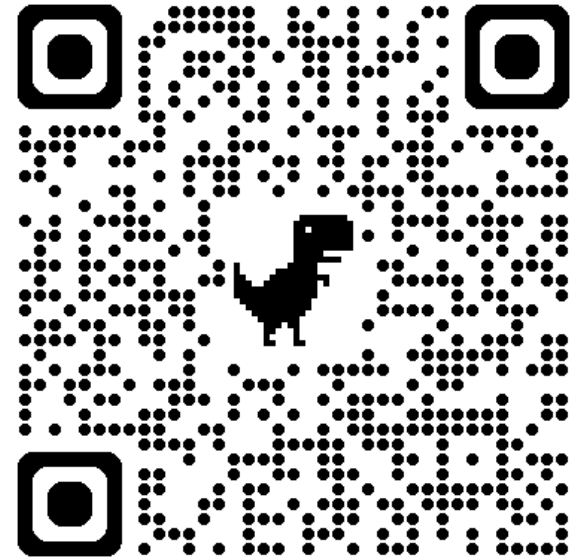

Post-secondary Options

4-Year Colleges & Universities

- More competitive admissions than most other post-secondary options
- Colleges consider multiple factors, including:
 - **Rigor of classes, GPA, test scores (SAT/ACT), extracurricular activities, essays, recommendations, demonstrated interest**
- Typically takes about 4 years to complete after high school (HS)
- Build a balanced college list:
 - 1-2 **Reach** schools | 2-3 **Match** schools | 1 **Safety** school
- Always check each college's website for current admission requirements (they vary by school and year)



2-Year & Technical Colleges

- HS diploma or GED required
 - Final transcript must be submitted (follow your school's transcript request process)
- Flexible testing options
 - SAT/ACT accepted, but many schools use the **Accuplacer**
 - Accuplacer is less expensive and used for course placement, not admission
- Short-term, career-focused programs
 - Typically completed in 2 years or less
 - Prepares students for immediate entry into the workforce
- Train for in-demand careers such as:
 - **Aviation, Criminal Justice, Welding, Cosmetology, Carpentry, Automotive, Medical/Dental Assisting, HVAC, Electrician, Graphic Design, Cybersecurity, EMT, and more!**



Military Options

- Five military branches: Air Force, Army, Coast Guard, Marine Corps, Navy
 - Includes **Reserve** and **National Guard** options
- Each branch has different enlistment requirements, including:
 - Citizenship & residency, age limits, education, ASVAB score, and physical and medical qualifications
- Education & testing requirements:
 - HS diploma or GED required
 - 4-year degree required to join as an officer
- Basic steps to enlist:
 - Make contact with a branch recruiter
 - Take the ASVAB
 - Graduate from HS
 - Request your final HS transcript

Understanding Application Types

- **Early Decision I & II (Binding)** – Cannot apply to other colleges for early decision, but can apply for regular decision. If accepted for early decision, must attend.
- **Early Action (non-Binding)** – Can apply early to other colleges and can apply for regular decision. Will receive an admissions decision before regular decision deadlines.
- **Regular Decision** – Standard deadline date established by the institution, with no priority
- **Rolling Admission** – Open admission; decisions given throughout the year as applications are received and until the limit set by the institution is met
- **Priority Deadline** – Similar to rolling admissions, but priority consideration around financial aid, housing, etc. is typically offered to these applicants



6 Steps of the Application Process

1. Determine what college(s) you're applying to and know their deadline(s)
2. Determine the application type(s) — e.g., Common App, Coalition, Direct to Institution
3. Complete your online profile/submit your application(s)
 - Class size: 541
 - Rank: None
4. Pay application fee(s)
5. Send your test scores directly from the testing agency — e.g. College Board or ACT
6. Use SchoolLinks — our “delivery system” to: 1) send your official transcript and/or 2) obtain teacher letters of recommendation

Remember, as the student/applicant, be sure to track your admissions status directly from the institutions' websites.

It is highly recommended that you take college campus tours!

Most (if not all) are free and can easily be scheduled online directly from the institution's website.



4-Year Colleges & Universities

- SAT/ACT test scores are usually required, with explicit score minimums.
- For admission for Fall 2026 and later, SAT or ACT scores will be required for:
 - University of Georgia
 - Georgia Tech
 - Georgia State University
 - Augusta University
 - Kennesaw State University
 - Georgia Southern University
 - Georgia College & State University

Test scores will continue to be required to apply for Zell Miller scholarships in accordance with state of Georgia requirements.



Sending Official Test Scores

- SAT/ACT scores can only be sent directly from the test agencies.

- Our school's CEEB code: **112435**
- **SAT/ACT and College Application Fee Waiver available online and in the counseling office. Must return with proof of benefits to our front office.**



Transcript Request Process

STEP ONE:

- Login to SchoolLinks and click on "Colleges"
- You will be prompted to complete a three-part set up process
 - Add your Birthdate, Email, and Home Address
 - Indicate if you qualify for application fee waivers (check off boxes that apply to you)
 - Complete your FERPA waiver
- If you are applying through Common APP- Link your Common App to SchoolLinks
 - On the left, select "Connect" under the Common App section
 - Select the "Link Common App" Button
 - Log in to your Common App account and then come back to SchoolLinks and refresh your page
 - Colleges on your Common App List will automatically populate on SchoolLinks
- Add your Applications
 - Either click the "Add application from list" button or click the blue "+ Add Application" button
 - Search and choose from the list and click the "Add Application" Button.
 - When adding the application, make sure to add it as "in progress". Select the "completed & pending" option if you have already submitted your application.
 - Once you save the application, SchoolLinks will automatically request the transcript

STEP TWO:

Pay for the number of transcripts requested.

You will pay for all transcripts online via MyPaymentsPlus (MPP)

- Under "Activities and Services," find Transcripts

YOU WILL NOT BE PERMITTED TO ADD THE TRANSCRIPT(S) TO YOUR CART UNTIL ALL REQUIRED FIELDS ARE COMPLETE.

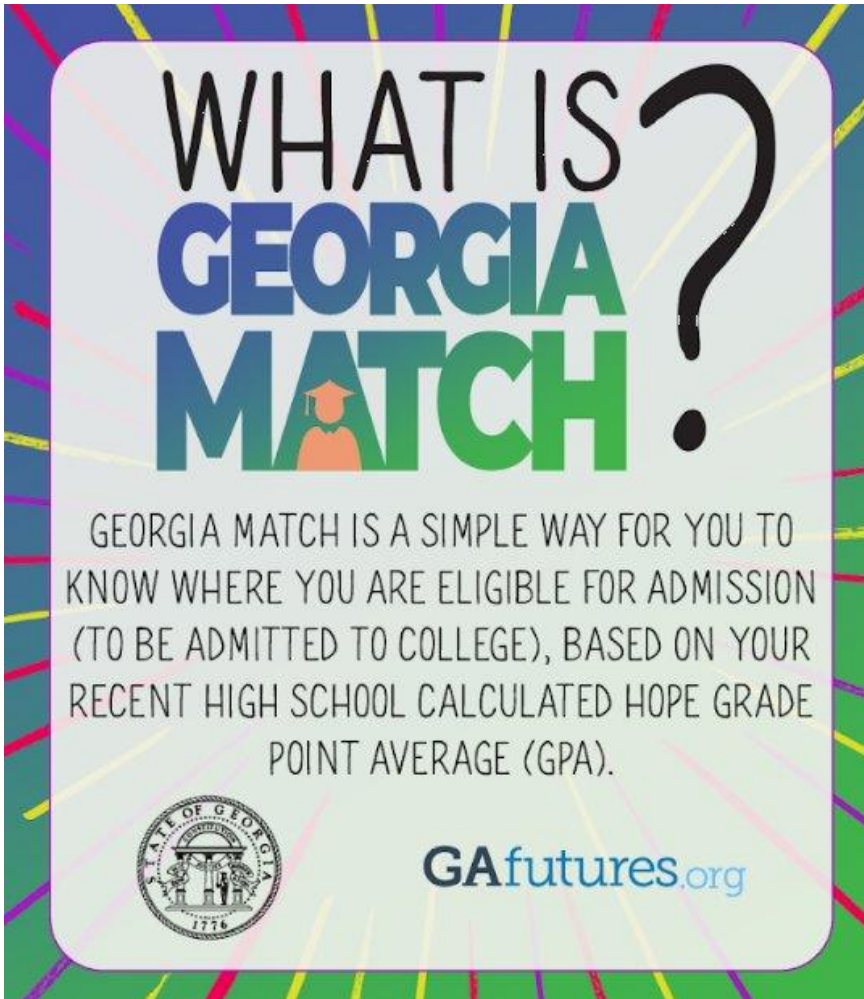

Once both steps are complete, your transcript will be sent. Please understand that it takes 24-48 hours to process your payment on MyPaymentsPlus. Allow at least 2-3 weeks for colleges to receive/update your application.

NOTE: Some colleges may take up to 6 weeks to process applicant documents. Please contact the college directly for updates about your application.



Georgia MATCH



- Georgia MATCH is a simple way for you to know where you are eligible for admission, based on your high school calculated HOPE GPA through 11th grade.
- Georgia MATCH works with public and private accredited high schools in Georgia.

Paying For College: Financial Aid

- Financial aid is an overarching umbrella for paying for college.
- There are several ways to pay for college, including options from the state and federal government.
 - Scholarships
 - Loans: Federal & Private
 - Federal Student Grants
 - Pell Grants are awarded to undergraduate students who have exceptional financial need
 - Federal Work-Study
 - Provides part-time jobs for undergraduate and graduate students with financial need, allowing them to earn money to help pay some of their educational expenses.
- Scholarships and grants **do not** have to be repaid.
- Loans **do** have to be repaid and typically include the amount borrowed **plus** interest.



Paying For College: Scholarships

- Types of scholarships:
 - **Merit-based** – Awards for grades, test scores, leadership, or achievements
 - **Need-based** – Based on financial need
 - **Athletic** – For students who play sports
 - **Talent-based** – For skills in music, art, theater, or dance
 - **Career/Major-specific** – For specific fields (e.g., nursing, education)
 - **Local** – Offered by community groups or businesses
 - **College** – Given directly by colleges
 - **Private** – Funded by companies or organizations
- Where to find scholarships for college:
 - SchoolLinks
 - GAfutures (Federal Aid & Scholarship > Scholarship Search)
 - College/University Financial Aid office websites
 - Online search engines (e.g., Going Merry, Fastweb, BigFuture/CollegeBoard)

Deadlines vary for each scholarship; make sure you pay attention and submit your application on time.



Paying For College: FAFSA

- FAFSA – Free Application for Federal Student Aid (opens **Oct 1st, 2026**)
FAFSA Virtual Night October 29th at 6:30PM.
Anna O'Brien- GSFC Outreach Representative. 404-706-1550
- It is an online application that is completed by students who want the opportunity to receive federal funding to pay for college.
 - Pell Grant (need-based)
 - Student Loans
- Must be completed on an annual basis and determines how much money one's family would be able to contribute to the student's cost of attending college
- Requires federal tax information from the student's family for application completion and submission

This application can also be used to satisfy the request to receive state funding for the HOPE program as well – HOPE/Zell Miller scholarship, HOPE/Zell Miller Grant, and HOPE Career Grant.



Paying For College:

HOPE/Zell Miller Scholarship

HOPE Scholarship

- Be a U.S. citizen or meet eligible non-citizen requirements
- Be a Georgia resident for at least one year. Must graduate from a Georgia high school
- Be in compliance with Selective Service registration requirements
- Must pass 4 rigor classes from GSFC's [Academic Rigor Course List](#)
- Must have a minimum of a 3.0 HOPE GPA upon graduation

Zell Miller Scholarship

- Be a U.S. citizen or meet eligible non-citizen requirements
- Be a Georgia resident for at least one year
- Must graduate from a Georgia high school
- Be in compliance with Selective Service registration requirements
- Must pass 4 rigor classes from GSFC's [Academic Rigor Course List](#)
- Must have a minimum of a 3.7 HOPE GPA upon graduation
- 1200 SAT (Math and Reading) or 25 ACT (Composite)

To check your HOPE GPA, visit GAfutures.org

You must have a GAfutures account to review your HOPE GPA.



Paying For College: HOPE/Zell Miller Grants

HOPE Grant

- Be a U.S. citizen or meet non-citizen requirements
- Be a Georgia resident for at least one year
- No GPA requirement
- No test score requirement
- Eligible for students working towards a certificate or diploma at any Technical College System of Georgia (TCSG)

HOPE Career Grant

- Be a Georgia resident
- Helps students start a well-paying career with little to no debt while also building a skilled workforce for Georgia employers
- Must be a recipient of the HOPE or Zell Miller Grant
- Eligible for students working towards a certificate or diploma at a technical college in programs that are considered high-demand career fields

Zell Miller Grant

- Be a U.S. citizen or meet non-citizen requirements
- Be a Georgia resident
- No high school GPA requirement
- A minimum 3.5 postsecondary calculated HOPE GPA at the end of each term is required in order to maintain eligibility
- Available to Georgia residents who are working towards a certificate or diploma at a Technical College System of Georgia (TCSG) or University System of Georgia (USG) institution



Paying For College: HOPE Program FAQs

How do I apply for the HOPE/Zell Miller Scholarship or Grant?

Answer: Complete the FAFSA each year OR complete the GSFAPP

What is the deadline to submit the HOPE Program application?

Answer: The last day of the school term or the student's withdrawal date, whichever occurs first.

What is my HOPE GPA?

Answer: It is viewable from the Your HOPE GPA tab after logging in to your GAfutures profile. It is not the same as your CCSD weighted or unweighted GPA.

Your Social Security Number (SSN) must be on file in the Cobb County student record system to receive any HOPE/Zell Miller funds!

Getting Started

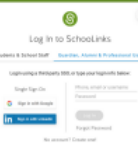

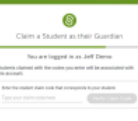

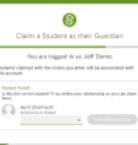


Claiming your Student

Once you're logged in or an account has been created, enter the claim code provided by your student or counselor exactly as it was given. Click Verify Claim Code.



After entering your claim code, it will show you the name of the student you're claiming and ask you to give your relationship to the student. Click Save Relationship.



It will now show that you've claimed your student! You may now either click Claim Another Student to repeat the claim process or Continue to Dashboard if you are done claiming students for now.



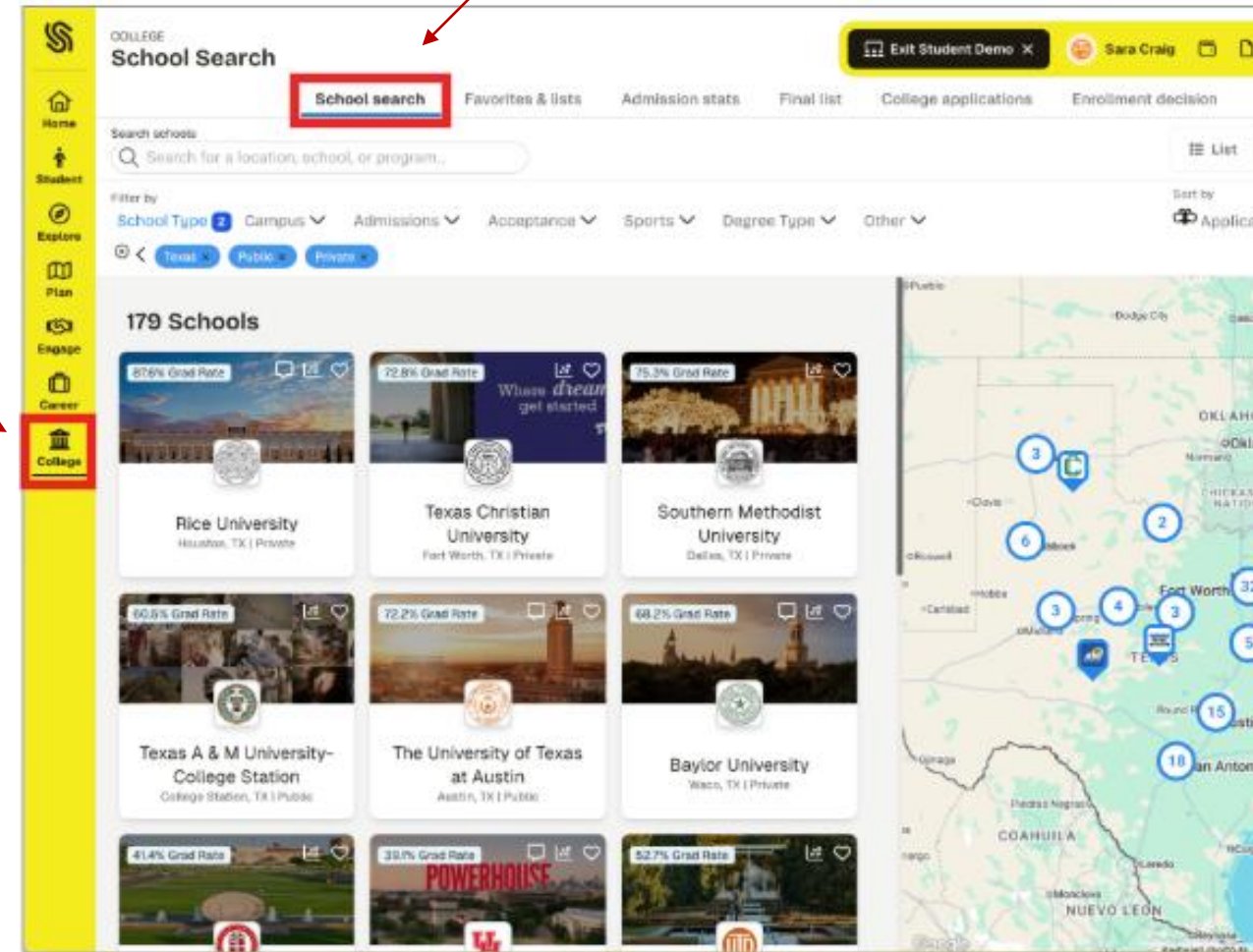


Create A Final College List: School Search

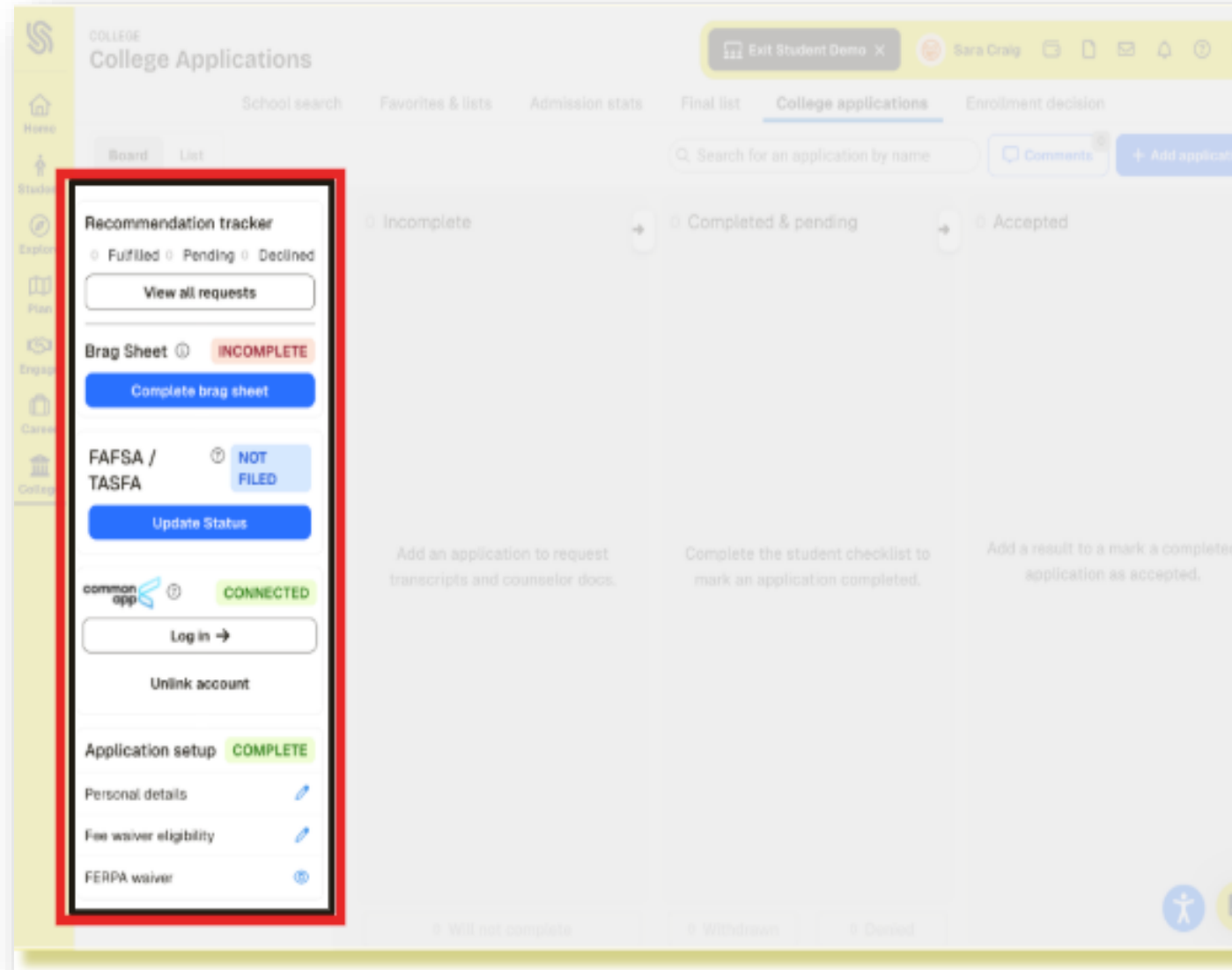

Add Recommenders

Students can search for a teacher or manually enter a teacher's name if it is not in the list.

The teacher will be alerted via email of the request.

NOTE: Counselor recommendations are automatically requested if required by the college.

Allow at least 3-4 school weeks for letters of recommendation to be completed.

It is the student's responsibility to research/know which schools require a letter of recommendation.

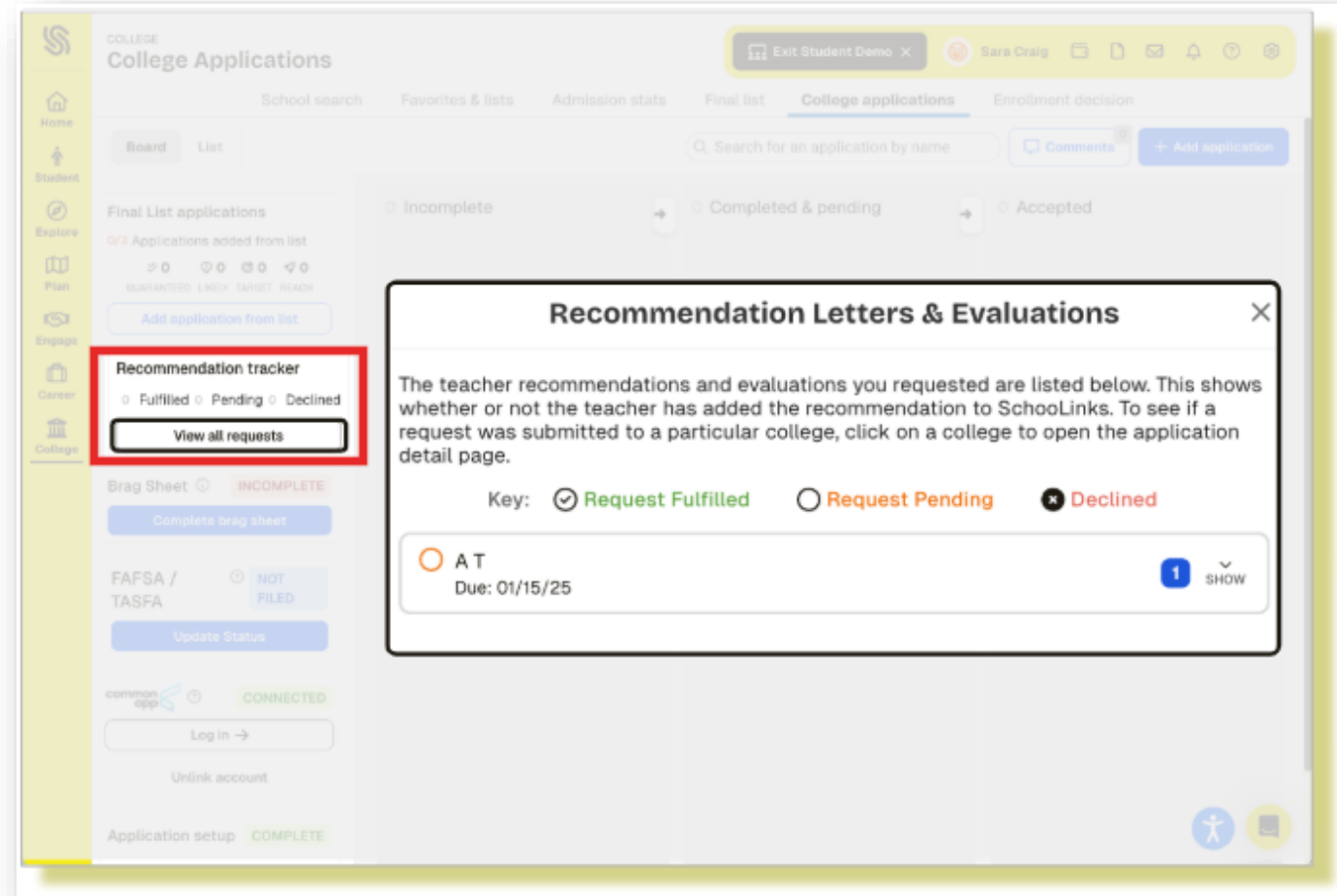

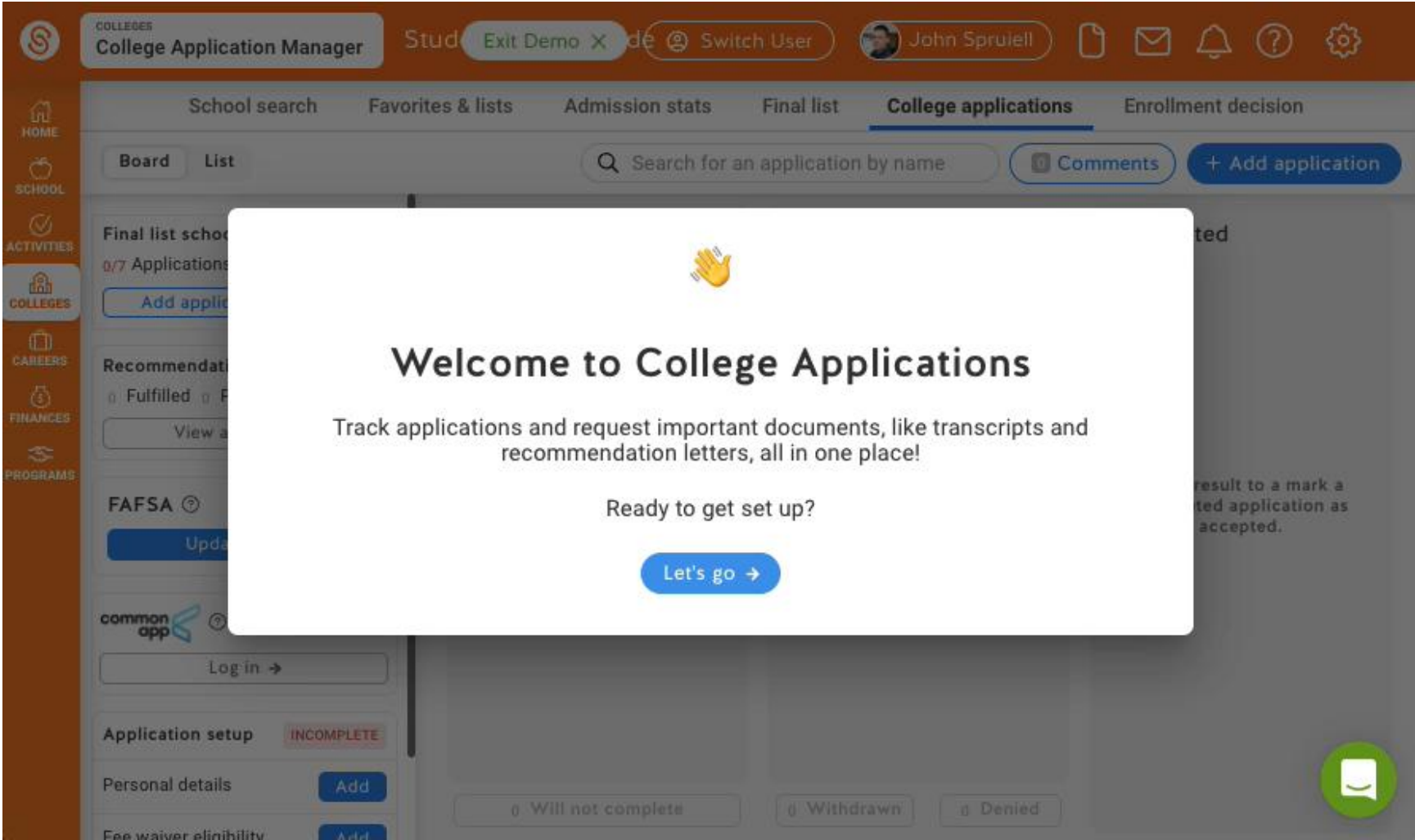
- Opportunity to hear from college admissions reps about their schools and admissions process.
